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Benefits of the CNS

Certification:

- Signifies that an individual possesses the knowledge and skills required to perform a set of competencies
- Sets the standard for a given discipline
- 3 E's: Education, Experience, Examination


Accreditation:

- "Certification of certifications"
- Evaluates a credentialing program against defined standards and accredits programs that meet those standards
- National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA)
- Both a process and a status

Benefits of Accreditation

- Credibility with regulatory bodies (state and federal), professionals, public, insurers and other stakeholders
- Trusted, third-party verification
- Demonstrates psychometric validity of Examination
- Supports certificants in the profession due to state licensure issues
- Note: Separation between education and exam

Supervised Practice Experience Overview

- 1 Satisfactory completion of the CNS Supervised Practice Experience is essential to being awarded the CNS credential. The program is structured to ensure each candidate obtains the in-depth knowledge and skills expected of an advanced-level nutrition professional while maintaining the flexibility required to achieve individual career goals. As such, candidates are responsible for tailoring their own supervised experience based on all program requirements outlined herein as well as locating supervisors that meet the qualifications outlined below.
- 2 Although the Supervised Experience Program may be completed before or after passing the BCNS Certifying Examination, it is important to note that historically those who have completed the practice experience perform better on the examination than those who have not. The CNS credential will not be awarded until the completed experience has been approved by the BCNS credentials council
- 3 The CNS Supervised Practice Experience consists of 1,000 hours of supervised practice in clinical nutrition care in the following nutrition categories in accordance with CNS Supervised Practice Experience Competencies. Work done in each of the categories must address the competencies outlined in Appendix A.
 - Nutrition assessment (200 hours)
 - · Nutrition intervention, education, counseling, or management (200 hours)
 - Nutrition monitoring or evaluation (200 hours)
 - · Remaining hours may be in any of the above categories
- 4 The supervised experience may be obtained entirely or partly from:

Types of Experience & Supervision

TYPES OF EXPERIENCE CNS CANDIDATES CAN EARN

Observational Experience (max 250 hours). **Examples include:**

- *Listening to videos or client/practitioner interactions
- *Sitting in on a consultation conducted by another practitioner
- *Participating in a virtual clinic or group mentorship program
 - *Role playing with colleagues
- *Conducting research on behalf of another professional

Independent/Direct Experience (min 750 hours). Examples include:

- *Spending time directly with the client *Researching and developing client treatment
- *Researching and preparing client handouts or other educational materials or client educational workshops
 - *Reviewing above work with a supervisor

Category A: Personalized Nutrition Assessment & Interpretation

Think of it as the initial consultation

Category B: Personalized Nutrition Intervention, Education, Counseling or Management

Think of this as the designing of a plan for a client. A candidate would be able to develop the right MNT for the health condition, make sure there are not drug nutrient interactions, understand the client's behavior (to know what type of changes they are willing to make as you develop a plan), use of botanicals in the recommendations, etc. (as listed out for competencies).

Category C: Nutrition Monitoring or Evaluation

Think of this as follow up consultations. Category C can cover all the competencies in A and B since you would do some of these competencies in a follow up appointment.

Supervisor Qualifications

- 3+ years full time clinical experience in nutrition care after obtaining the req. degree
- Must hold at least one of the following:
 - CNS credential in good standing; or
 - Master's of science* or doctoral degree* in a field of nutrition/dietetics; or
 - Licensed MD/D*O with didactic training or education and experience in clinical nutrition as documented by 75 CE credits or the equivalent over the past 5 years (without exception); or
 - Doctoral-level health professional* (e.g. DC, ND, PharmD) who meets curriculum eligibility requirements for CNS and who can legally provide nutrition services in the state of practice. Doctors of Chiropractic (DCs) must also be a CNS or MS, Nutrition.
- *The supervisor's qualifying degree must be from a regionally accredited institution.
- Supervisors may not be married to, related to or domestic partners with the supervisee(s)

What is a CNS® nutritionist?

"Nutritionist" is a broad term that includes individuals with various training and credentials. The CNS is an accredited certification that distinguishes advanced nutrition professionals, enabling them to practice medical nutrition therapy and other aspects of nutrition care in many states.

Personalized nutrition (PN) considers the unique makeup of individuals and groups of people with similar traits creating a person-centered approach to nutrition science, education, and clinical care.

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CNS Credential Maintenance - Recertification

- Ongoing professional development

This map can only generalize complex state laws. Select a state to see a summary of its law. Read the entire state law for full detail.



KEY

- It is illegal to perform individualized nutrition counseling unless licensed or exempt. Effectively only RDs are eligible for licensure.
- It is illegal to perform individualized nutrition counseling unless licensed or exempt. There is a pathway to licensure for CNSs, RDs, and other advanced nutritionists.
- It is legal for all to perform individualized nutrition counseling, other than medical nutrition therapy in some states. Some states offer state licensure or state certification to CNSs. RDs. and other advanced nutritionists.
